Articles of Agreement; Bules and Regulations;

We, the soldiers and sailors, and honorably discharged soldiers and sailors, of the Army, Navy and Marine Corps of the United States, who have consented to this Union, having aided in maintaining the honor, integrity and supremacy of the Mational Severnment during the late Rebellion, do unite to establish a permanent Association for the objects hereinafter set forth; and do ordain and establish the following rules and regulations for the government of this Association.

Chapter 1.

Article J. Title.

This Association shall be known as the "Department of Missouri, Grand Army of the Republic".

Article II.

The objects to be accomplished by this organization are as follows:

- To preserve and strengthen those kind and fraternal feelings which bind together the solders, sailors and marines, who united to suppress the late Rebellion, and to perpetuate the memory and history of the dead.
- 2. To assist such & mer comrades in arms as need help and protection, and to extend needful aid to the widows and orphans of those who have fallen.
- 3. To maintain true allegance to the United States of America, based upon a paramount respect for, and fidelity to, its Constitution and Laws, to discontinue whatever tends to weaken levelty, incites to insurrection, treason or rebellion, or in any manner impairs the efficiency and permanency of our free institutions; and to encourage the spread of universal liberty, equal rights and justice to all men.

Article III. Organization.

The several constituted bodies of this association shall consist of :

- 2. A National Organization to be known as the National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, having the same objects and purposes, of which this corporation shall be a constituent part.

 Article IV.

Eligibility to membership.

Soldiers and Sailors of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps, who served between April 18th 1861, and April 9th, 1865, in the war for the suppression of the Rebelliam, and those having been honorably discharged the refrom after such service, and of such State regiments as werengalled into active service and subject

to the orders of MW U. S. General Officers, between the dates mentioned, shall be eligible to membership in the Grand Army of the Republic. No person shall be eligible to membership who has at any time borne arms against the United States.

Chapter Il.

Artiele I.

Section 1. This organization whall be governed by a Department Encampment, subordinate to the National Encampment.

Chapter III. Article 11. Hembership.

The Department Encampment shall consist of:

Piret.— The Department Commander, all Past Department Commanders who have served for a full term of one year, or who, having been elected to fill a vacancy, shall have served to the end of the term, so long as they remain in good standing in their respective Posts, and the other officers mentioned Art. IV., Sec.2, of this Chapter, and all Past Post Commanders who have served for a full term of one year, or who, having been elected to fill a vacancy, shall have served to the end of the term, so long as they remain in good standing in their respective Posts, in such Departments as have so decided by a two-thirds vote at an amual meeting.

Second.- All the Post Commanders for the time being throughout its jurisdiction (in the absence of the Post Commander the Senior

or Junior Vice Commander may represent the Post.)

Third. - Members selected by ballot by the several Posts in such ratio as may be determined by a two-thirds were of the members present and voting at my previous Annual Engagement. These elected members, and an equal number of alternates, shall be chosen at the time and in the mode of electing officers of Posts, at the first stated meeting in December, and shall serve during the year, commencing on the first day of January following. Any vacancies that may occur shall be filled in the wave memor as provided in Chap. II., Art. VII., Sec. 5.


They shall be furnished with eredentials signed by the Post Commander and Adjutant, a copy of which shall be forwarded immediately after the election to the Assistant Adjutant General of the Department. But all Posts in arrears for reports or dues shall be excluded, for the time being, from representation, either by Post Commander or otherwise, in the Department Encampment.

Fourth.- The number of representatives to which each Peut is entitled shall be determined by the quarterly report last preceding the election.

Artiele III. Meetings.

Section I. There shall be an annual meeting of the Department Encampment between January first and May first of each year, and a semi annual meeting, if so determined at the annual meeting of the Department or by the Council of Administration.

Sec. 2. Special meetings may be convened by order of the Commander, by and with the advice and concent of the Council of Administration, provided that no business except that specified in the order for such special meeting shall be transacted thereat; and no alterations affecting the general interests of the Department shall be made at a special meeting.



Article IV.

Section 1. All members of the Grand Army of the Republic in good standing shall be eligible to any office in this Department. Sec. 2. The officers of the Department shall be a Germander, a Senior Vice Commander, a Junior Vice Commander, an Assistant Adjutant General, an Assistant Adjutant General, an Assistant Quartermaster General, an Inspector, a Judge Advocate, a Chief Mustering Officer, a Medical Director, a Chaplain and a Council of Administration, consisting of the above named officers and five members by election.

Article V. Election of Officers.

Section 1. These of fivers, except the Assitant Adjutant General, the Assistant Quartermenter General, the Inspector, the Judge Advocate, and the Chief Mustering Officer, shall be chosen at the annual meeting of the Department Encampment in each year by ballot.

See. 2. The officers thus elected shall enter upon their respective duties immediately after the adjournment of the meeting at which they were chosen, and shall hold office until their successors are duly installed.

Sec. 3. All vacancies in elective offices may be filled by the Council of Administration.

Article VI.

Duties of Officers.

Section 1. The Department Commander shall, immediately after entering upon his office, appoint an Assistant Adjutant General, an Assistant Quartermaster General, an Inspector, a Judge Advocate, and a Chief Mustering Officer, and may remove these officers at his pleasure. We may appoint as many Assistant Inspectors, on the nomination of the Inspector of the Department, and as many Aides—de-Camp as he may deem necessary. He shall preside at all meetings of the Department Encampment and Council of Administration Shallsforward the reports and dues to National Meadquarters, and see that all orders received from themse are properly published and obeyed, shall issue suitable sharters to all Posts organised in his Department, and perform such other duties as are incumbent of officers of like position.

Sec. 2. The Vice Germanders shall assist the Commander, by counsel or otherwise, and in his absence or disability they shall fill his off co according to seniority.

See. 5. The Assistant Adjutant General shall keep correct records of the presentings of the Department Encamposant and of the Council of Administration; he shall conduct the correspondence, and issue all orders under direction of the Commander; draw all requisitions upon the Assistant Quartermaster General, make out all returns to the National Handquarters, and transmit the same, through the Department Commander, to the Adjutant General; countersign all charters issued by the Commander, keep an Order Book, a Letter Book, and Indoressent and Muserandum Book, and files of all orders, reports and correspondence received and remaining in his office, and perform such other duties, and keep such other records in connection with his office, as may be required of him by the Commander or the Department Encamposant. We shall receive as compensation for his services, such sum as the Department Encamposant may, from time to time, determine.

See. 4. The Assitant Quartermaster General shall held the funds, securities, vouchers and property of the Department and fill

all requisitions drawn by the Assistant Adjutant General and approved by the Commander, and shall give good and sufficient security, to be approved by the Council of Administration, for the faithful discharge of his duties.

Sec. 5. The Inspector shall perform such duties as shall be prescribed, and shall receive such compountion for his services as the Department Encampment shall from time to time determine.

See. 6. The Judge Advocate and the Chief Mustering Officer shall perform the duties properly belonging to their officers.

Sec. 7. The Medical Director shall require such returns from Post Surgeons as may be needed and called for by the Surgeon General, and shall make returns to that officer.

Sec. 8. The Chaplain shall perform such duties in connection with his office as the Commander of the Department may require of him.

Sec. 9. The Council of Administration shall have charge of the working interests of the Department, shall audit the accounts of the various officers, shall keep a full and detailed account of its proceedings, and shall present the same for the consideration of the Department Encampment at each stated meeting thereof.

Sec. 10. The various staff officers shall make, to the Department Encampment at each stated meeting, full and complete reports in writing, of the operations of their departments, and when retiring from office, shall deliver to their successors all moneys, books and other property of the Department in their possession or under their control.

Article VI!.

Appeals.

All members have the right of appealing through the proper channels from acts of the Posts or Post Commanders, and Department Commander or Encampment, to the next highest authority, and to the Commander in Chief, whose decisions shall be final, unless reversed by the National Encampment, but all decisions appealed from, shall have full force and effect until reversed by competent authority.

Artiele VIII. Votime.

Each member present at a meeting of the Department Encampment shall be entitled to one vote. The ayes and note may be required by any three members representing different Posts.

Article X.

By-Laws.

This Department Encampoent may adopt By-laws for its government, not inconsistent with these rules and regulations, or the by-laws or orders of the National Encampoent, and may provide for the alterations and amendment thereof.

Charle W. Article H. Politics.

No officer or comrade of the Grand Army of the Republic shall in any manner use this Organisation for partisan purposes, and me discussion of partisan questions shall be permitted at any of its meetings, nor shall any nomination for political office be made.

> Article RIA. Relief Fund.

A Relief Fund for the assistance of needy soldiers, sailors and marines, and widows and orphans of deceased soldiers, sailors and marines, shall be established by the several Posts, and any

Chapter I.



Brief History

For years the Headquarters of the GAR in Missouri was at the Temple Building, 19 So. Broadway - Room 303, St. Louis Missouri (now Marriot Downtown Hotel).

In 1928 the Temple Building was condemned and the GAR ordered out. Apparently they did not go immediately but finally did.

Eventually (unknown if this is the first place they went after the Temple Building closed) was the Victoria Building, north of Locust and west of 8th Street. The Victoria was the rebuilt 1893 St. Nicholas Hotel (designed by Louis Sullivan)

Room 614 served as GAR Dept of Missouri headquarters at least during 1931.

Records from the encampments of the Department of Missouri from 1884 through 1940 are at the St. Louis Public Library, Downtown Branch.







DEPARTMENT OF MISSOURL

In July, 1865, an association was formed in St. Louis under the title "Volunteer Mutual Aid Society." Its principal purpose being to secure employment for honorably discharged Union soldiers and sailors who at this time were returning in large numbers, almost all seeking work and, with the exception of cases of

absolute destitution and want, declining charity.

The managers of the society were Mayor Jas. S. Thomas, Colonel R. J. Rombauer, Dr. Spiegelhalter, Dr. Linton, Colonel Henry Flad, Major F. T. Ledergerber, Colonel Jos. Weydemeier, Gen. J. McNeil, Dr. Philip Weigel, Judge Thos. J. Dailey, Gen. J. B. Gray, Hon. Geo. Partridge, Col. Philip Murphy, Col. Chas. G. Stifel and Captain F. Leser. Up to April 6, 1887, this association had obtained positions for 1,803 veterans, and there being no pressing necessity for further united work, the association was

dissolved and the balance of funds on hand transferred to the Soldiers' Orphan Home in St. Louis.

The date of the formation of the first Post in Missouri cannot now be stated, but the records show that General John McNeil, St. Louis, was appointed Provisional Commander in July, 1866, and Colonel F. T. Ledergerber, Adjutant-General. In August, General Chester Harding, Jr., succeeded Colonel Ledergerber, and Chas. Kantriner was appointed Assistant Adjutant-General. He resigned some time later, and Alex. Lowry, also of St. Louis, was appointed his successor.

One of the most efficient Posts in the interior of the State was organized October 1, 1866, in Kirksville, Adair county, in Northeast Missouri, a town of decided Union proclivities. Dr. R. H. Browne was elected Post Commander, and with other members of this Post organized a number of Posts in that section. The Post was maintained until 1871, and was reorganized in 1880. In that year a large reunion of Union soldiers was held there, lasting four days. Another successful reunion was held in 1885.

The Department was organized on May 7, 1867, General Carl Schurz, Grand Commander. A large number of Posts were formed during the year. The membership was largely composed of men who had entered the Federal service in April and May, 1861, and by the capture of Camp Jackson, kept St. Louis and Missouri in the Union, and so secured the first great success in the war.

The excited political disputes between President Johnson and Congress, in 1867-68, led to an intense feeling on the subject in Missouri, and the members of the Grand Army there, strong in their political convictions, believed that another civil war was impending, and that it was their duty as Union soldiers to express their opinions in positive terms.

At a representative meeting of the different divisions and Posts of the Grand Army, held at Central Turner Hall, St. Louis, Department Commander General Carl Schurz presiding, Comrade R. J. Rombauer, by unanimous instruction from the Second Division, presented resolutions stating that the final sovereignty of this nation rests in Congress then defending the results and fruits of the late war, and in case of an open breach with the President, the Grand Army of Missouri pledges its unconditional support to the American Congress. These resolutions were unanimously adopted.

On May 14, 1868, a Department Encampment was held and the following officers were elected: Grand Commander, R. J. Rombauer; Senior Vice-Commander, Joseph W. McClurg; Junior Vice-Commander, William J. Pile; Surgeon-General, Jos. Spiegelhalter; Chaplain, Francis Romer; Assistant Adjutant-General, John O. Schoener; Assistant Quartermaster-General, Philip H. Murphy; Council of Administration—John S. Cavender, John McFall, G. A. Finkelnburg, E. L. King and D. P. Dyer.

Later Chas. V. Soden succeeded Comrade Schoener as Assistant Adjutant-General. The Department was divided into Districts, with competent officers, and everything was done to make

the Department thoroughly efficient.

There were at this time twelve Posts in St. Louis, fourteen in St. Louis county and eighty-three in other Districts—one hundred and nine Posts in all.

On Memorial Day, May 30, 1869, the Posts of St. Louis made an imposing demonstration in decorating the graves of the dead. Department Commander Rombauer, referring to this, said: "It may be considered a new era that in the midst of a community once the scene of civil war, the newspaper press, without distinction of political creed, swayed its influential powers to celebrate the occasion of paying the tribute of gratefulness to the fallen patriots to whom we owe the victory of the cause of humanity, the peace of the country and the prosperity of the nation."

Notwithstanding the interest displayed in the Grand Army in these early years it soon began to decline. No reports were made to National Headquarters after 1871, and the Department organization was subsequently abandoned.

In 1875 efforts were made to reorganize several of the Posts, and Captain T. E. Lonergan, St. Louis, was appointed Provisional Commander. He removed to New York in the fall of that year, and Comrade Ford Smith was appointed his successor, but there was not sufficient encouragement to continue these efforts and they were given up for several years.

REORGANIZATION.

Comrade J. C. Walkinshaw, commanding Department of Kansas, then on the postal route from Leavenworth to St. Louis, undertook the work of organizing a Post in the latter city. At a

meeting for the purpose, held on December 8, 1879, in Governor Fletcher's office in St. Louis, Comrade Walkinshaw, assisted by Comrades F. R. Potter and J. B. Pachall, mustered John Reed, Thomas B. Rodgers and Stillman O. Fish, and at a second meeting, a week later, added J. W. Francis, Robert B. Beck, G. Harry Stone and John O'Connell. These comrades, with Geo. G. Chase, Richard Mollencott, F. R. Potter and J. B. Pachall, on transfer, were formally mustered as Frank P. Blair Post No. 1, January 8, 1880. Later Lewis Moore, E. M. Joel, B. Seaman and A. Dreifus were mustered, completing the list on the charter.

On April 24th, General John S. Cavender, St. Louis, was appointed Provisional Commander for the Department; David Mur-

phy, Assistant Adjutant-General.

It was exceedingly hard work to obtain a foot-hold for the organization in the State, and required two years of time to secure the muster of the number of Posts required to form a Department.

On April 22, 1882, a convention to organize the Department was held at Kansas City, with representatives of nine Posts present: Post 1, St. Louis; Post 2, St. Louis; Post 4, Kansas City; Post 7, St. Joseph; Post 8, Kansas City; Post 9, Kansas City (a colored Post which soon disbanded); Post 10, Rich Hill; Post 11, Lexington; Post 12, Grant City.

Major William Warner, Commander of Geo. H. Thomas Post No. 8, Kansas City, was elected Department Commander and served two years, having chartered over 160 Posts, with a mem-

bership in good standing of 6,696.

MUSTER OF GENERAL W. T. SHERMAN.

On December 9, 1883, a charter was issued for Ransom Post No. 131, St. Louis. The application for charter was headed with the signature of General W. T. Sherman, who had then been retired as General, United States Army, and had settled at his old home in St. Louis.

The ceremonies of muster-in, on December 19, 1883, were attended by Department Commander Warner and Staff, and comrades from a number of Posts in the Department.

General Sherman was elected Post Commander and served the remainder of that term. He has each year since been unanimously elected Representative-at-large from the Department of Missouri to the National Encampment.



THIRTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF BLUE LODGE

January 13, 1897, rounded out thirty years of Masonic influences in Carthage and the event was duly celebrated by the blue lodges of the county. A delegation from Joplin, Webb City, Earlville, Oronogo and Sarcoxie being present at the meeting of the Carthage lodge. E. B. Jacobs, master, presided. Past Master Robinson, who, was the first presiding officer of the lodge, was present, was escorted to a seat at the right of the chair and given an ovation. At the close of the lodge the ladies of the Eastern Star served a supper to the craft.

DEPARTMENT ENCAMPMENT, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

The Seventh Annual meeting of the Missouri department, G. A. R., was held in Carthage, May 19-21, 1898, and was a great event in G. A. R. and Sons of Veterans circles at the county seat. Stanton Post No. 16, of Carthage, was a strong one and composed of some of the best business men of the city, and the department was entertained in a most excellent manner. The city was profusely decorated with flags and the grand opera house, where the meetings were held, was exceptionally well ornamented with the national colors.

Among the pictures which graced the walls of the building were the familiar faces of the great soldiers of the Civil war and the new heroes of the day—Roosevelt, Dewey, Sampson, Schley, and Fitzhugh Lee, who, in the Spanish-American war, were winning new laurels for the nation.

The meetings of the department were presided over by John R. Platt, of Kingston, department commander. Senior Department Commander Col. Chas. H. Morgan, of Lamar, was the only state officer not answering to roll call, but when his name was called the department adjutant made the announcement that he was with the boys of the Fifth Missouri, fighting for Cuban independence and this announcement was greeted with a round of applause.

Over six hundred veterans registered at headquarters. The veterans were from the troops of twenty-two different states. Among those who registered was H. B. Kramer, of St. Louis, who was in Carthage with Sigel and, as a member of Essy's famous battery, participated in the battle of July 5, 1861. A severe rain storm spoiled the parade and this was a great disappointment to the people.

In the election of officers, Capt. T. B. Tuttle, of Carthage, was chosen junior vice department commander, as a mark of token of regard

for the splendid work he had done as chairman of the committee of arrangements.

At the close of the session Captain Tuttle, on behalf of the Carthage veterans, presented each of the delegates with a beautiful G. A. R. badge, made in blue and gold, as a pendant, which hung from a tiny silk United States flag.

The encampment closed with a basket picnic at Lake Side Park, which was a very enjoyable affair.

GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC ENCAMPMENT OF 1893

The meeting of the Missouri Department, Grand Army of the Republic, in Joplin April 12-14, 1893, was an important event and brought to the "City that Jack Built" fully five thousand visitors. Joplin never does things by halves and on this occasion entertained the veterans of the Union army in a royal manner. The Confederate veterans joined with the citizens and extended to the boys in blue a magnificent welcome.

The encampment was opened by a reception to the veterans and a general good time was had. Old acquaintances were renewed, war stories were told and songs were sung, bringing back to the old soldiers the stirring times and scenes of the early sixties. C. W. Whitehead, of Kansas City, department commander, presided over the sessions of the encampment. Among the distinguished visitors present were National Commander A. G. Weissert, of Milwaukee, Wisconsin; Past Commander William Warner, of Kansas City, and Ex-Governor Phelps, of Springfield.

The morning session was given over to routine business, the appointment of committees, etc., the two principal features of the day being the grand parade in the afternoon and the campfire at night.

THE PARADE

The parade occurred at four o'clock in the afternoon and was a magnificent affair. Over fifteen hundred veterans were in line. The military and semi-military societies of the city acted as escort and helped to lend enthusiasm to the occasion. Past Commander E. W. Beach was the

grand marshal and, with his aides, Col. J. V. Pierce and Captain Galen Spencer, formed the big parade and promptly at the hour set gave the signal to "forward march."

The order of march was as follows: City marshal; platoon of mounted police; Chief Marshal Beach; Mounted orderlies; First Division, Gen. Charles W. Squires, marshal; Carthage Light Guard Band; Canton Lincoln, I. O. O. F.; Joplin Light Infantry; Division No. 40, U. R. K. of P.; Joplin fire department; Second Division, A. H. Brewer, marshal; Nevada Martial Band; National Commander Weissert; Department Commander C. W. Whitehead, and staff; Delegates to Department Encampment; G. A. R. Third Division, H. W. Davidson, marshal; Kansas Drum Corps; Merrill Camp, Sons of Veterans and all visiting Sons of Veterans.

Southwest Protective Association and other mounted bodies.

Main street was lined with people from Second to Ninth, and the sidewalks were impassable from Third to Seventh. Hundreds of people congregated at points of vantage on the side streets. Most of Joplin was out to view the spectacle. The music, the bright uniforms of the civic societies, the measured tread and military appearance of the Grand Army posts, and the waving flags and banners, combined to inspire an enthusiasm which broke out in cheer upon cheer when the Central school building was reached. Here the pupils of the public schools were massed. They occupied both sides of Wall street from Ninth to Seventh and their lines extended from the curbing to the fences. Others were massed in the yard of the Central school building and all of them were supplied with flags which they waved vigorously. The veterans uncovered as they passed between the lines and cheered in return for the cordial greeting of the pupils. This was a marked and most interesting icature of the parade. The Joplin Daily Herald, in commenting on the parade had an interesting column, "On the Skirmish Line." Following are some of the interesting notes: Colonel Cunningham's Cavalry contributed an important feature to the parade.

The U. R. K. of P. made an excellent showing.

Canton Lincoln was complimented all along the line.

Capt. M. M. Rice as captain of the guard looked well in uniform.

The registry department was thronged the entire day by searchers for old army comrades.

Hassendeuble, F. P. Blair and Rausom posts, of St. Louis, made a magnificent appearance.

The mounted police presented a fine appearance and did good service in clearing the line of march.

"Marching Through Georgia" is now, as it was nearly thirty years ago, the popular song of the soldier.

Next to Missouri, Illinois regiments have the largest representation in the registers; Iowa comes next. Next to Commander-in-chief Weissert, Past State Commander Warner is one of the youngest looking men in the encampment. National Commander Weissert marched in line with the boys and it is the first time that the commander-in-chief has ever marched on foot in a parade. He marched with Department Commander Whitehead, Post Commander Warner, and Assistant Adjutant General Rogers, and they were as youthful appearing a quartette as could be found in the column.

James Hire, of the Joplin Post, beat the army record for lung power

by blowing the street electric wagon machine up to 2200.

J. E. McNair, ex-postmaster of Webb City, searched the register carefully for a familiar name amongst the Lawrence veterans.

Chaplain Haggerty, who has served several terms, wears his hair, which is as white as the snow flakes, a la Andrew Jackson.

Captain Teets, who was a member of the first Ohio Infantzy, looked in vain on the register for the name of a member of his regiment.

The fine appearance of the delegations from the several St. Louis posts excited frequent favorable comments along the line of parade.

George H. McCann, of the Old Coon Tobacco works, at Springfield, sent the boys a barrel of smoking tobacco and a supply of pipes.

Hon, W. S. Norton, of Scammonville, Kansas, attends the encampment and renewed acquaintance with his former Joplin neighbors. He was marshal here during the exciting time of the Lupton riot.

McConey & Son and T. W. Cunningham will be kindly remembered by the delegates for a bountiful supply of ice water conveniently placed for their use on the sidewalk in front of the Bank of Joplin.

Colonel J. P. Tracey, United States marshal for the western district of Missouri, is a member of the Springfield delegation. Colonel Tracey can laugh just as loudly as when he was the modest editor of the Carthage Banner.

Past Commander Warner evidently enjoys good digestion and an easy conscience. He left his uniform at home because the pantaloons lacked four inches of being sufficient for his equatorial expansion.

The United chorus by the entire department which accompanied Commander Whitehead's solo "Marching Through Georgia" at the afternoon session, fairly made the Club Theatre building tremble with the immense volume of patriotic melody.

When the encampment adjourned at noon it marched to the Frisco depot and escorted National Commander Weissert to his hotel. At the afternoon session a committee was appointed to escort him to the Club Theatre. He was there formally introduced to the encampment and delivered an address.

THE CAMP FIRE

The camp fire at the Club Theater was the crowning event of the session, and long before the hour for opening the building was packed to its capacity. Mayor R. B. Tyler for the city; president F. E. Williams, of the Joplin Club, both delivered addresses of welcome and Past Depart-

ment Commander Rassieur and Major William Warner responded on behalf of the old soldiers.

Rev. J. J. Martin of the First M. E. church and at that day one of Joplin's most entertaining talkers and Judge Charles G. Burton, department commander-elect, were called for and made pleasing talks. Inspector General Henry was called and responded with a patriotic song which set the audience wild with excitement.

Miss Nellie Bartlett, now Mrs. Snyder, of Kansas City, then one of Joplin's most charming elocutionists, gave a reading which was the hit of the evening. The Carthage Mandolin Club and the G. A. R. Glee Club, of Kansas City, interspered the speeches with musical hits and patriotic airs.

The evening's entertainment was closed with a drill by sixteen pretty high school girls, under the command of "Col." V. Letta Speaks, then one of Joplin's popular lady teachers.

ELECTION

It is always customary to elect the junior department commander from the city where the encampment is held and Past Commander Henry Phelps was honored by the G. A. R. for this important post.

At the next annual encampment — — — — , Post Commander J. L. Briggs, who perhaps more than any other one man had made the Joplin meeting a success, was selected as Missouri's representative on the National Council of the Grand Army of the Republic, and was three successive times reelected. At the meeting of the Woman's Relief Corps Mrs. J. L. Briggs was chosen department vice president and at the next meeting passed to the chair.

They Have a Fine Time at Willow Springs
-Looked Like a County Fair, Owing to a
Display of Vegetables and Live Stock.

The G. A. R. encampment at Willow Springs was largely attended, and the town had more visitors than probably ever before. Addresses were made by Col. J. J. Martin, of West Plains, and Dr. A. Mullinix, of Willow Springs. The Willow Springs glee club furnished excellent music. Many of the veterans brought fruit and vegetables and displayed them
