This photo was taken on May 31, 1888 from the balcony of the Southern Hotel on 3rd Street in Ste. Genevieve, MO. The Belvedere on top of the Southern Hotel was as an observation post during the Civil War by Union Soldiers. At the time of the photo the Southern Hotel was owned by Joseph Vorst a veteran of the Civil War.

The following article was found in the Ste. Genevieve Fair Play Newspaper, June 2, 1888. We believe that this article describes the photo above.

"The J. Felix St. James Post No. 326 G. A. R. made a very creditable display in their handsome uniforms, on Wednesday last Memorial Day, as they marched in procession through our streets to decorate the graves of Union soldiers. Mayor Rozier, who accompanied the procession as an invited guest, escorted in his carriage, Mrs. Elizabeth St. James, relict of Lieut. Colonel St. James, after whom the post is named. At the grave of his brother, Capt. Gustave St. Gem delivered an address on the time honored custom of decorating the last resting places of departed friends. The members of the post then proceeded in vehicles to the Valle Spring cemeteries where the ceremony of decoration was concluded. The Progressive Coronet Band headed the procession in its handsome chariot."

The general public and especially all Confederate and Federal soldiers is invited to unite with the local soldiers in commemorating this beautiful occasion.

Decoration Day, May 30, will be duly observed in this city as it always has been in the past. The local G. A. R. Post, at a special meeting held for the purpose last Sunday, made final arrangements to the effect that the marches, including the members of the Post, preceded by the Ste. Genevieve Brass Band, will leave headquarters at the residence, of Frank Huck at 9 n m. and visit the various comsteries where renose the remains of their decess ed comrades and on whose graves will be placed flowers and a flag 医脑腔性周炎 计电力计

If you read the article you will read that those leaving flowerw were to leave them at Post Commander Huck's house. This is one of the only places that we know for sure where the G.A.R. in Ste. Genevieve met that the building is still standing.

Thursday, Decoration Day, was observed by J-Felix St., James Post G. A. R. in a very impressive style. At 9 o'clock a. m. assembly was sounded at headquarters. The Old Veterans fell in behind the local band and marched south on Main and cast on. Merchant street to the old cemeteries, where me-morial services were held at the grave of J. Felix St. James, after whom the Post is named, Chap-lain. Charles Godat, assisted by Judge Erank J, Huck, conducted the services. Mr. H. Ward Hicks read Abraham Lincoln's address at Gettysburg. The band played "Nearer My God to Thee," after which the graves of all veterans. Union and Confederate, were des-orated with flowers and flags. The old soldiers are gradually answer-Main and east on Merchant street old soldiers are gradually answermg the command of the Great Commander, and their ranks are peropping noticeably decimated.

-Decoration Day was observed here by J. Felix St. James? Post G. A. R. last' Thursday morning. The old veterans, headed by the Band, left headquarters and made n short parade through town, then proceeded to the symeteries and decoratee the graves of departed comrades with Hags and flowers. Some records have been recovered and documented in Bob Schmidt's book, "Veterans and Events In the Civil War in Southeast Missouri, Vol. II."

Meeting Facility (structure still exist? stand alone building or shared-use building? identify specific location)

The Union Hall (Jokerst-Yealy Mercantile), which is located on the corner of Merchant and Third streets (northeast corner) in Ste. Genevieve, Missouri is where the J. Felix St. James post was located.

Additional Information

The photo is of Rozier's Mercantile, which housed the Jokerst-Yealy Mercantile on the second floor. This building is from the 1920's and probably served as the GAR post until it closed August 1925.

The previous building on this site was the house of the GAR post through most of its history in Ste. Genevieve.

History of J. Felix St. James G.A.R Post No. 326 1887-1925

Researching Ste. Genevieve County Union Army veterans of the Civil War requires significant time spent in the libraries reading newspapers, family and county histories. Early on, I became acquainted with the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) Post #326 located in Ste. Genevieve and began taking notes, hoping some day to present its history. Here are the results of the past couple years, though not to be taken as complete as other research sources are still being sought.

The first Grand Army of the Republic Post was founded in Illinois twenty years before the Post in Ste. Genevieve was organized in 1887. By then, the GAR had a resurgence, following declines in membership in the early 1870's. Probably, the passing of pension legislation by the Civil War veterans, then in public office, encouraged Union veterans to join or to establish posts in their communities. For a long time, one could not get elected to public office without having seen service in the War and pension checks accounted for nearly one-fifth of the National Budget at one time.

Yearly National Encampments were held throughout the United States where the veterans could get together, share reminiscences and fellowship and establish a platform for their interests. No doubt doubt the politicians courted the favor of this large bloc of voters, similar to today.

The Post in Ste. Genevieve was formally opened on May 25, 1887 with ceremonies conducted in the City by Col. T.B. Rodgers, Assistant Adjutant General of the Missouri Department of the GAR at the **Union Hall**. Ads for the Union Hall are found in the 1880's newspapers with Leon Jokerst as the proprietor. It was located on the corner of Merchant and Third Sts. and boasted a "large and commodious dancing hall, for the use of Balls, Concerts, Shows, etc., over the Saloon." Later, this was the site of the Jokerst-Yealy Mercantile Co. store which partially burned in an early a.m. fire in June 1898.

Post No. 326 was named after Lt. Col. Joseph Felix St. James of the 13th Missouri Infantry who died of wounds received at Shiloh on April 8, 1862. His life was profiled in a recent book on area Civil War veterans. Some of the Post's first members reads like a City/County Directory and included such names as: Jokerst, Rottler, Siebert, Beckerman, etc. The Ste. Genevieve Herald and Fair Play newspapers regularly carried news of the Post's activities, especially on Memorial Day. These latter accounts are the most informative of the Post's gatherings as the veterans (sometimes in uniform) went from cemetery to cemetery honoring the fallen from the War of 1812, the Mexican War and the Civil War. Graves for many veterans, now no longer identifiable, are mentioned in these entries. A contingent of the GAR were also present at each burial of one of their number, much the same way as the veteran's organizations do today. Frequently they are mentioned as pallbearers or honorary pallbearers.

A Membership Roster has been compiled and is shown below. It is taken primarily from two sources. One, are the accounts from the local weekly newspapers. This includes the goings-on of the Post itself such as Memorial Day festivities, elections of new officers and obituaries. Two,

is the Index to Death Rolls of the GAR, Missouri Division 1882-1940 put together under the direction of the State Historical Society Of Missouri, Columbia. This publication is available from the Society and includes information for the entire State. Unfortunately, the officers of Post #326 either did not keep good records, they were destroyed after the Post closed or they have not yet been discovered. Sometimes, the minutes to GAR meetings were kept/given to local historical societies while others are in the land fills. The clerk of Post #326 did not usually send a Roster to the State Headquarters either. (The year 1892-93 is the exception. Seventy six members were listed in 1892. and sixty nine in 1893, but no names were given.) If only they would have provided a Roster in 1895 as there is a listing of the men for this year with company and regiment. The Post did send a report to the State Headquarters when a member died, and these are in the yearly reports that are indexed in the publication above. Whether they sent one in every time is not known. However, there may be a great many men who were members of Post #326 who died elsewhere, either as a non member or as a member of the Post in the community to which they moved. For these reasons, the complete roster for any one year, or decade, will never be known UNLESS someone can come forward with the local records kept by the Post!! Some records are extant for Post #215, Farmington, Missouri so we can be hopeful. A few of the members of this latter Post lived in the western part of Ste. Genevieve County.

Post #326 closed its doors in August, 1925 with three veterans still as members. Other Posts remained open but, by 1940, there were only 1,000 members nationwide and by 1949 only six were still alive. There could be a resident of Ste. Genevieve County who may have some memorabilia from an ancestor who was a member of the GAR. If so, please make it available to an officer of the Foundation or to myself for display at our next meeting.

Here is the Roster that I have compiled with the regiment to which the veteran belonged, if known.

The several veterans who belonged to the GAR and saw service with the 21st Missouri Infantry (7), the 47th Infantry (9), the 2nd Missouri Light Artillery (6) and the 78th Enrolled Missouri Militia 6) reveals the camaraderie that must have existed. There are reasons for the large number of men in these four Regiments.

The ranks of the 21st Missouri had been depleted substantially by September, 1864. Many local men who got caught by the draft that fall entered this regiment for one year. Consequently, they were still in the Army after the War had ended. Many were used as guards and escorts in and around Mobile, Alabama. Men in the 47th all were from Co. K that was organized in Ste. Genevieve County, also in the fall of '64, for six months. They were discharged in March 1865. Surprisingly, there are not more veterans of this company in the Roster. Men of the 2nd Missouri Light Artillery were mostly Germans and were men who enlisted early in the War. Considerable research has been done on the area veterans in this Regiment. The 78th Enrolled Missouri Militia was organized from men in Ste. Genevieve and Jefferson Counties and much research on it is now being done, emphasizing on the service of Anselm Stolzer. Stolzer still has relatives in the County as does other men in this Regiment. These men did not serve outside of the State of Missouri but were occupied stemming the tide of the bushwacker/guerrilla activities in Southeast Missouri. Likely many of them later joined the 47th Missouri Infantry as well as other regiments.

It is my belief, that as more men are identified as being members of the GAR Post #326 in Ste. Genevieve County, they will have served in one of the above four regiments.

Lt. Col. J. Felix St. James Post #326

The Ste. Genevieve Lt. Col. J. Felix St. James Camp #326 was mustered in by Col. T. B. Rodgers, Asst. Adjutant General of the Missouri Department of Missouri of the Grand Army of the Republic, on May 26, 1887. The event took place in the Union Hall located on the northwest corner of Merchant and 3rd street. Seventeen boys in blue comprised the charter members. They included Leon Jokerst, Wm. H. Bantz, John W. Schmahle, Albert Lalumondier, Valentine Rottler, Wm. V. Skewes, Simeon Labrayere, Francis Bernard, Leo Herzog, Francis Beauchamp, George Beckerman, Fred Schaefer, Jacob Yealy, Michael Lafleur, August Seibert, George Will and Henry Stolte (1).

The first mention of a hall came in the October 8, 1887 Ste. Genevieve Herald when the newspaper reported three new members were mustered in on September 26th (2). No description of the location of the hall was mentioned in the article.

A January 12, 1895 article in the Ste. Genevieve Herald reported on the installation of Post officers for the coming year and mentioned that the headquarters were located on Market Street (3).

A May 18, 1901 Ste. Genevieve Herald article mentioned that the Post would begin their Decoration Day ceremonies from their headquarters in Union Hall beginning at 9 am (4). A May 25, 1901 Ste. Genevieve Herald article indicated that the Post had headquarters at Union Hall, their old quarters being occupied as an office for the railroad under construction (5). The Union Hall was located on the northwest corner of Third and Merchant. See 1901 Sanborn map of this area (6).

An October 18, 1902 article indicated that Charles Baumann had rented the lower floor of his brick building to Herzog & Wipler (7)

On January 3, 1903, the Ste. Genevieve Fair Play reported that the Post had moved their headquarters above Herzog & Wipfler's Shoe Store (8). The January 3, 1903 Ste. Genevieve Herald gave more explicit clues to the location of the headquarters as they reported that "the G. A. R. had moved their headquarters from Union Hall to the Baumann bldg. on Market St. over Herzog & Wipfler's shoe store last Wednesday" (9).

A City Election Notice for the April 7, 1903 election noted that the Third Ward would vote at the Grand Army Hall above Herzog & Wipfler's Shoe store (10). It should be noted that Wm. H. Bantz was the Commander of the Post in 1903. This again confirmed the location of the G.A.R. headquarters in 1903.

An October 10, 1903 article described the Herzog & Wipfler shoe store as a 22 x 50 feet in size (11).

In December 1904, the Post planned to have a meeting on the 3rd Sunday in December to consider moving the headquarters as reported in a December 10, 1904 Ste. Genevieve Herald (12). The December 24, 1904 Ste. Genevieve Herald reported that they had decided to stay above the Herzog and Wipfler shoe store and that arrangements were being made with Mrs. Baumann (13).

According to a May 27, 1905 Ste. Genevieve Herald article on Decoration Day, it was requested that "flowers and wreathes will be thankfully received at headquarters above Herzog's shoe store" (14).

It should be noted that Herzog and Wipfler had parted company June 1, 1904 (15). It should also be noted that the Union Hall was being dismantled in September 1905 (16) and the Jokerst and Yealy Mercantile Co. built a new store on the Union Hall Site (17). This department store building was

destroyed by fire on July 16, 1922(18). It was replaced by the current building on that location (now the DuBourg Centre). See photo of current building on this location (19)

Both the 1894 (20) and 1901 (21) Sanborn maps of Ste. Genevieve show a Cobbler's store on Market Street in Block 17. The 1911 Sanborn indicates the building was vacant (22). A later Sanborn in 1929 shows that the building had been modified (23). Ads in the newspaper for the shoe store do not give the street address. However, the fact that the Baumann's owned the property gives us a clue as to where the shoe store was located. In the Ste. Genevieve deed records, Charles Baumann bought property on Market Street described as shown in Book 93 Page 94 (24). An October 18, 1902 Ste. Genevieve Herald article indicated that Charles Baumann had leased the lower floor of the brick building to Herzog &Wipfler shoe store (25). The October 10, 1903 Ste. Genevieve Herald described the Herzog & Wipfler shoe store as 22 x 50 (26). The corner of the current building located at 326 Market Street is 63 feet from the corner of Market and 4th.

Based on this information, we can conclude that the first identifiable remaining headquarters of Post #326 was at 326 Market Street. See the 2016 photo of the current building which is owned by the Quarry Workers Local 829 and serves as their union hall (27).

On December 16, 1905, the headquarters of the Post were moved from Market St. to a house on F. J. Huck's Lot on Lahaye street (28).

A 1908 Southeast Missouri Drummers Magazine included a biography of Francis J. Huck and also showed a picture of his house. See photo in notes (29). This location as headquarters at this house is confirmed by a May 25, 1907 Ste. Genevieve Fair Play which reported that the Decoration Day march "will leave headquarters at the residence of Frank Huck (30). It is further confirmed by a 1909 City Election notice that indicated the First Ward would vote at "G. A.R. Hall at Frank Huck's" (31).

An April 3, 1909 notice of election indicated that the 1st Ward would vote at the G. A. R. Hall at Frank Huck's (31). See 2016 photo of 230 Lahaye in notes (32).

The headquarters were still on Lahaye Street in 1915 as the May 29, 1915 Ste. Genevieve Herald reported that the line of march for Decoration Day is as follows; Start at 1 p.m. sharp from G. A. R. Headquarters on Lahaye Street" (33).

Frank Huck, a county probate judge, died on Oct 1, 1922 while serving as Commander of the Camp in 1922. He was succeeded by Charles Schuler Sr. In 1925, the Camp was disbanded according to Herald August 22, 1925(34). It is unknown if there was a formal headquarters in 1923 and 1924.

In summary, there are at least two locations still existing in Ste. Genevieve, 326 Market St. and 230 Lahaye, where the Lt. Col. J. Felix St. James GAR Post 326 had their headquarters. They also had their headquarters at the Union Hall located on the corner of Merchant and 3rd Street but that building is no longer in existence.

To date, no minutes from the Post as well as the portrait of J. Felix St. James, a flag (35) presented to the Post on February 1, 1888 as reported in the Jan 21, 1888 Herald and the minutes of the Post.




6. 1901 Sanborn showing location of Union Hall


Addendum to the Lt. Col. J. Felix St. James Post #326 Study on Headquarter Locations

As stated in the study, the Post had their headquarters in the Union Hall located on the northwest corner of Merchant and 3rd street to the north of the courthouse between January 1901 and January 1903. This is shown on the 1910 Sanborn Insurance map in the upper right hand corner in the following

Also when the study was initially published it was thought that there were no pictures of the Union Hall in existence. However, Bill Naeger, local photographer and owner of Main Street Gallery pointed out that the Union Hall was visible in the background of photo taken on 3rd Street before the Decoration Day parade of 1888. This parade is well documented and in particular indicates that Mrs. Susan E. St. James, wife of the departed J. Felix St. James was in the parade.

-The J. Felix St. James Post No. 326 G. A. R. made a very creditable display in their handsome uniforms, on Wednesday last, Memorial Day, as they marched in procession through our streets to decorate the graves of Union soldiers. Mayor Rozier, who accompanied the procession as an invited guest, escorted in his carriage Mrs. Elizabeth St. James, relict of Lieut. St. James, after whom the post is named. At the grave of his brother, Capt. Gustave St. Gem delivered an address on the time-honored custom of decorating the last resting-places of departed friends. The members of the post then proceeded in vehicles to the Valle Spring cemeteries where the ceremony of decoration was conclud-The Progressive Cornet Band ed. headed the procession in its handsome chariot.

Decoration Day. Decoration day was observed here on Wednesday morning with appropriate ceremonics by the J. Felix Bt. James Post No. 326 G. A. R. The members of the Post turned out in uniform at halfpast nine A. M., and, preceded by the Progressive Cornet Band, marched out to the old Catholic cemetery, where they halted at the grave of J. Feltx St. James, after whom the Post is named. Here Capt. Gustavns St. Gem, brother of the distinguished soldier who lost his life in the defense of the Union at Shiloh, delivered a short address, commending in warm words the general pbservation of Decoration Day as a fitting and well-deserved tribute to the patriotism of the men who, in the hour of need, did not shrink from the highest duty of freemen - to lay down their lives. in the defense of freedom. After the address, which, though short, drew tears from many an eye, the voterans broke ranks and decorated the graves of the heroes of the country with bunting and floral offerings prepared for the occasion by the ladies of Ste. Genevieve and vicinity. The graves so decorated were those of J. Felix St. James, Moise Gpvreau, Louis LaRose, Frantz J, Botz Uerman Kasteer, Florian Geiler, Antoine Dici-[1812], Auguste St. Gemme [1812]. The Post next proceeded to the bld


city cemetery, where the same honor was shown to the memory of James Sims, the Sims, and Benjamin Smith. At the Odd Fellows' Gravyard the following graves ware decorated : Frank Leavenworth, Arthur Bantz, Amos Colver, August Witteneyer, and August Schweiss.

The German Lutheran, cometery was next, and there the vaterans' tribute of respect was shown to the last resting places of Christoph Peterson and Peter G. Jaccard.



Historic Structure Burns



This house at 230 Lahaye Street was damaged by fire on May 13. The house served as the headquarters for the Grand Army of the Republic's Lt. Col. J. Felix St. James Post No. 326 from 1909 to at least 1915. Prior to that, it reportedly was the residence of Francis J. Huck. It served as a Ward 1 polling station in April 1909, being identified as "G.A.R. Hall at Frank Huck's." Huck, a county probate judge, died in 1922. He also was the commander of the G.A.R. 

The Munsch building was mentioned in a Feb. 16, 1884, Ste. Genevieve Herald article.

Leon A. Jokerst was born in the German Settlement, February 10, 1845, on the farm at present cultivated by Mr. August Baechle, and is now 39 years of age. His wife, Mary R. Munsch, is 34 years old, and is the daughter of the late Mr. Nicholas Munsch, one of the first German settlers of Ste. Genevieve. They were playmates from early childhood, and their friendship ripened into mutual love, so that their union for life was purely an affair of the heart. They were united in the holy bonds of matrimony at the Ste. Genevieve R. C. Church, by the Rev. F. X. Weiss, on Shrove Tuesday, February 9th, 1869, the following day, Ash Wednesday, being Mr. Jokerst's birthday. Mrs. Jokerst was born in her present residence, the Munsch building, and was educated at the Academy, conducted by the Sisters of St. Joseph. Mr. Jokerst took an active part in the internecine strife between the Northern and Southern States, serving as an artillerist in the Union Army. He has always been an energetic, public-spirited citizen of Ste. Geneveve, striving to develope its resources and advance its interests. He was among

A Feb 18, 1905 indicated that Jokerst and Yealy had bought the Munsch building also known as the Union Hall.




A Jan. 12, 1895, article revealed that their headquarters were located on Market Street.

The installment exercises of the newly elected officers of the J. Felix St. James Post G. A. R. of this city will be held at the Grand Army Headquarters on Market street at two o'clock this afternoon. Everybody is cordially invited to attend.

The preceding information establishes the date when Post 326 moved to the Union Hall, a date previously unknown.
