Deserters can't get pensions, even if they came back and served later, so they pulled his money. Most of his file revolves around his fight to get his pension back. Youngblood to be the cover of the issue!



Let me know if there is a place where I could upload all the images of this letter!





Hello Rebecca,

Great find, and thank you for bringing this to our attention! Your dissertation topic sounds fascinating. There are some amazing gems hidden in those pension files, as you've clearly already discovered! I'm assuming the correspondence was from Curtis Post, No. 9, GAR, based in Siloam Springs. Correct?

The primary goal of the Sons of Union Veterans' National GAR Records Programs is to locate repositories of records, inventory them, and provide that information as a directory to researchers and other interested parties. The Deed of Conveyance between the GAR and the SUVCW specifies that, in the event that we come into possession of records, we should use our "best endeavors to return said records to the communities

where Grand Army posts were located." Nationally, we don't have the resources to conserve physical records (or even copies), however, some departments in our organization have very active regional records programs.

Arkansas falls within the service area of the SUVCW Department of Missouri, which hosts one of our most active records programs (including collections of digital images). I'm cc'ing Walt Busch on this, as he is my contact there and I know he will be interested to learn more about this.

I'd like to note this letter in my database, giving you credit for finding it. Could you provide me with the pension file application number and name of the applicant/beneficiary, also the date of the letter and any other pertinent details? I'd also love to see the photos you took! If you come across any other references to the location of records for Arkansas GAR posts, please let me know. I'm woefully lacking in information there.






Hi!

I'm a PhD candidate at the University of Arkansas and my dissertation focuses on the experience of Civil War veterans in northwest Arkansas, especially men who lived in the area in 1860 and fought for the Union. In the course of my research, I came across a letter in a pension file, written on the letterhead of the Siloam Springs, Arkansas GAR post, and it appears to include the signatures of most of the membership. I may have done a little dance in the middle of the research room of the National Archives when I saw it because I'm very interested in understanding who, how and where these men connected with each other after the war, so it's a great find for me. However, is the SUVCW collecting records of GAR Posts or just registering where they are located? The letter is, of course, still in the hands of the National Archives which has kept it safe for so long already, but I took pictures of it and would be happy to share those if it would help in any collection projects you may be running.

From a family page on Ancestry.com, reposted from Find-a-Grave: "Doc" or Franklin was named Doctor Franklin by his parents because of their hopes he would become a doctor. He spent much of his youth in Mississippi prior to his family moving to the NW part of Arkansas. Doctor Franklin married and started his own farm in Denver Arkansas prior to the Civil War. At that time he and numerous other Youngblood relatives from the area, joined the Federal forces and served with the 1st Arkansas Calvary. He was made a 1st Lt. in Company K in that Regiment. After the war ended, he and his wife moved to Dallas County, Missouri and raised their family on a farm near present day Bennett Springs. He was a great story teller and wrote many historical sketches of his family and was a devoted family man and faithful to his Methodist faith all his life.

My dissertation will have a section on GAR posts in the area; its size will depend on what I'll be able to track down. People in northern Arkansas seem to have willfully forgotten their Union veterans - you wouldn't believe how many family genealogists I've shocked by exposing their Unionist roots! My own family included. Both my mother and my father have a g-g-g-great grandfather who lived into the 20th century on his federal pension and no one knew until I found them in my research. I'm worried GAR records may have been destroyed out of a lack of respect. Any direction Walt can give would be helpful, and I'll be sure to share anything I find on my own.

The fate of GAR records varies from state to state, but in general, I continue to be amazed at how many have survived.

Interesting about your family's Unionist roots! It just goes to show how personal the war was for so many. I have a similar but opposite twist in my ancestry. My g-g-g-granduncle was born in central Pennsylvania and was living in Iowa a few years before the war. He was kind of a black sheep in the family and a drifter. By April 1861 he was in Arkansas, where he enlisted in Josey's (15th) Arkansas Infantry. When I mention his CS service to folks in Pennsylvania, I get a similar shocked reaction!
