

Department Commander Sumner Hunnewell attended this year's Lincoln Tomb Ceremony in Springfield, Ill., and laid a wreath for the Department.


The event was very well attended by camps and the other Allied Orders.

Solomon Was Right

"Masquerading or shall we say INSECT TRANSFORMATIONS? What are we coming to? Transfigurations of sex are bad enough, but what shall we say of transmutations? Of men dressing like women, and wearing perfumes and jewelry, and embroidered shirt-bosoms, and all but lisping in their speech? Or of women wearing hats and feathers, boots and spurs, and cropped hair, and carrying canes, and walking the streets with a swagger, like young moss-troopers, turned adrift on half-pay?

"Time was, in our 'Rough and Ready' clubs, composed of both sexes, with great advantage to both, since the women were strengthened and the men softened by the association, that the worst you could say of them was, that the men were 'rough,' and the women 'ready'; but how is it now? If we may believe our own eyes, or put any trust in correspondents over sea, the two sexes have seriously begun to interchange appearances, if not characters; to undergo not only a transfiguration outwardly, but a kind of transmutation, casting aside, or adopting as the whim of the hour may suggest, or interchanging, what have hitherto been regarded as among the essential characteristics of each, in voice, look, attire, step, and carriage. Is there no help for this? And no harm in it?

"When the 'Macaroni' of Sheridan's day, the bucks and foplings, and lisping dandies, the whippersnappers and popinjays and 'coxcombs' and 'exquisites,' who have appeared from time to time ever since, were in full feather, a correspondent change took place in the habiliments, manners, and speech of women, till even lady "Gay Spanker" was no caricature, and the bloomer costume itself but a kind of retaliation.

"But if we are to have a change, and for the better, what shall it be? And how shall it be introduced? and when? Before the present fashions have gone so far, that like the Moors and Brazilians, a man may not be able to recognize a wife or daughter in the street, nor even to know whether he is giving the wall to a man or a woman?

"Shall the two sexes assimilate or approximate? or fly off still further from a common type in their attire? What are the true indications of progress and refinement? And what of barbarism, in this matter?"



Solomon tells us that there is nothing new under the sun. This is the start of an opening article in initial *The Northern Monthly* from March of 1864. The Northern Monthly: A Magazine of Original Literature and Military Affairs published in Portland, Maine, and seemed to last one year, but it was packed with news of the War, casualty reports, Maine troop positions, and also wartime poetry. If I run into anything else, I'll be sure to pass it along.
