

Donald Lee Roussin Sr., 89, of Ellisville died Jan. 2, 2021, in Ballwin. Mr. Roussin served in the U.S. Army during the Korean War. He obtained his bachelor's degree from Southeast Missouri State and his master's degree from Webster University, and taught in the Lindbergh School District until his retirement. Born July 26, 1931, in De Soto, he was the son of the late Cecil and Goldie (Sanders) Roussin.

He is survived by his wife: Bonnie (Hoyt) Roussin of Ellisville; four children: Donald (Mary Ellen) Roussin Jr. of Maryland Heights, Jennifer (Craig) Hoover of Ballwin, Charles Roussin of Brooklyn, N.Y., and Lisa (Michael) Dean of Cumming, Ga.; a brother: Doug (Kathie) Roussin of De Soto; a sister -in-law: Sherryl Roussin of Fenton; and six grandchildren: Hope Dean, Austin Dean, Natalie Hoover, Landon Hoover, Joe Roussin and William Roussin. He was preceded in death by an infant child; and a brother: Dean Roussin.

Letter from Thomas Fletcher

on the Capture and Release of Soldiers from the 50th Mo. Infantry

October 23, 1864

Hd Qrs 47th Regt Mo Infty

DeSoto Oct 23d 1864.

Colonel,

I have the honor to state that several enlisted men of Companies "A."E"F"G"H"&I" of this Regiment and a number of men of the 50th Regt. Mo Vol Infaty. whe were captured by the command of the Rebel General Price during the recent raid in this state and for want of means on the part of the rebels to transport or keep them were paroled and are now at Benton Barracks

I respectfully ask that these men be ordered to report to their respective commands. They not having been delivered at any of the places of exchange mentioned in the cartel nor exchanged or paroled upon any agreement between the commanding officers of the contending armies, nor paroled through an officer.


With Spring almost on us, it's hard to believe this wasn't that long ago.

JOHN H. "JACK" CHANCE

John H. "Jack" Chance, 83, Columbia, MO passed away Friday, February 12, 2021 at the Boone Hospital Center in Columbia, MO. He was born November 30, 1937 the son of the late F. Gano and Anna Lee (Toalson) Chance. On January 30, 1976 he was united in marriage to Linda (Barto) Chance.

In addition to his wife Linda of 45 years, he will be sadly missed and lovingly remembered by three sons Brad Grannis and his wife Lisa of Phoenix, AZ, Tony Chance and his wife Colleen of St. Albans, MO and Garry Chance of Columbia, MO; one daughter Shannon Grannis and Mark Hatcher of Capitola, CA; seven grandchildren Nick Grannis, Liz Grannis, Anthony Chance, Jackson Chance, Ella Chance, Alexa Westlake and Sher Westlake; several nieces and nephews; other relatives and many dear friends. In addition to his parents, one brother Phil Chance preceded him in death.

Jack graduated from Centralia High School and served his country in the United States Navy. He owned and operated A.B. Chance Co. with his family in Centralia, MO for many years. Later he was instrumental with the Chance Foundation which helped to support the Centralia Battlefield site. Jack was a member of the Sons of the American Revolution, Sons of the Confederate Veterans, Kiwanis, Centralia Jaycees and Students of Free Enterprise. He was awarded and Honorary Doctorate from Southwest Baptist College in Bolivar, MO. He was instrumental in constructing and promoting the Centralia Battlefield site and he loved golf and most of all spending time with his family and grandchildren.

He later traveled to Centralia on February 20 to attend the funeral of Tiger Camp member Jack Chance.

The meeting was called to order before 7 p.m. (Sumner was late.)

Doug introduced Cindy, Leonard Wright's sister, who lives in Rhode Island.

Doug let everyone know about an email from Dept. Secretary Edward Krieser about Form 27, which is due on April 30 with a per capita check. He also referenced another email from the Brother Krieser about our Orders statistics. As of February 28, our Order has total membership of 6207. Doug also discussed General Order #12 on licensing.

Doug asked about the National Encampment. How can the Auxiliary help? There will be opportunities to help with the raffle table, as guides, check-in. We are waiting for a regular sign-up sheet. Doug said that he will want a table or two for sale / display. All forms should be on the **suvcwmo.org** website.

Summer noted that Form 22 was filed. He discussed the Department Meeting in Jefferson City, talking about two items that came up. The first was the marking of GAR Post meeting places with a plaque. The other was that we are coming up with forms for accepting donations. This helps provide a paper trail and avoid having to trust peoples' memories.

Alan presented the treasurer's report. No movement on the sword raffle. Doug mentioned his trouble with a computer scam.

The Auxiliary gave a quick report. The bank balance is unknown at this time.

Doug bought a small book for us to keep track of camp activities. If anyone has anything to add, please send to Doug. This will track who-did-what-when.

Two JRTOC awards will be presented by Doug. The first is for Randal L. Windsor (Farmington HS) for April 7. The second is for Austin Slavens (Fredericktown HS) for April 16. Doug gave awards to the ROTC coordinators already.

We discussed Memorial Day. The De Soto City Cembery on Boyd/Grand Streets has Civil War grave and USCT infantry & light artillery graves. Doug has gone to Wal-Mart to see if they will supply 50 U.S. Flags, writing on Camp letterhead stationary. He will talk to the city manager to see if we can have a ceremony. This would take place on Monday, May 31st. Sumner asked if Chris Warren had all of these graves registered. No one knew. Kelly asked if we could go early and

clean-up the black section of the cemetery, which is overrun with bushes? This would be good PR and a spring project. Doug plans on going with his metal detector to look for disposed GAR markers. Evidently, old gravestones would be broken and thrown into a nearby ditch

Woodworking for Pilot Knob is still up in the air. The price of wood has doubled. Doug called John but didn't hear anything back. Doug with rout to make a finished project. Doug suggested that everyone donate an 8' x 1" x 6" board. Kelly gave money to Don to buy wood for her family.

Pilot Knob looks good to go. There is not going to be an public invitation but people can still attend.

Sunday, April 11 at 2 p.m. in Hillsborough, will be a memorial for Leonard Wright. Doug will check to see if we can do a salute. Chris Warren had a revised graveside service for Civil War headstone dedications. We will need volunteers in uniform, if we can participate with a volley as well as performing Taps.

Next month, we agreed to have a dinner meeting at Café 21, 48 Jefferson Square, De Soto. We arrive at 5:30 p.m. for a 6 p.m. dinner. We will have a side room at no charge. We are asked to dress out.

We are being asked to participate in the Old Mines Church Festival, May 15, as a living history group.
