# FORT B STATE COLLEGE

ON THIS EMINENCE NORTHWEST OF THE CITY FORT B. ONE OF FOUR CIVIL WAR FORTIFICATIONS IN CASE GIRARDEAU WAS ERRECTED BY FEDERAL TROOPS IN 1861 TO STAFF THE FERRYVILLE AND JACKSON ROAD. ITS GARRISON FORTED BY THE BATTAL OF CASE GIRARDEAU ON APRIL 26, 1862. IN 1873 THE SITE WAS CHOSEN FOR THE CAMPUS OF THE DISTRICT NORMAL SCHOOL. NOW THE COVINGTON MANOR STATE COLLEGE.
