

secretary and manager Landis Machine Co., St. Louis; now president of Champion Shoe Machinery Co., manufacturers of shoe and harness machinery. Member Citizens' Industrial Association. Served in Civil War in 1st battalion, Pennsylvania Volunteers [private, Co. G, 1st Pennsylvania Infantry enlisting July 1, 1864 and was honorably discharged Nov. 10, 1864]. Republican. [Joined the G.A.R. in Chicago's Thomas Post No. 5 and later transferred to Ransom Post 131 in St. Louis]; [Elected Ransom camp commander in 1906 and Department Commander in 1915]; member Union Veteran Club, Chicago, Pennsylvania Society of St. Louis.
