

participation.



Veterans Day observances in Gridley began with a ceremony held at the Gridley-Biggs Cemetery in honor of Pvt. H. C. Veatch, otherwise known as Colonel Veatch. Pvt. Veatch was the last Union veteran in Butte County.

Gen. Geo. Wright Camp 22 CC Owen Stiles MC'd the SUVCW-sponsored event, which included the mayors of Gridley and Biggs, the American Legion, VFW, and Veatch family members. Stiles described the Last Soldier Project and explained that Pvt. Henry Clay Veatch, Co. C, 5th IN Cav., tried to enlist at the age of 13, but was sent home. He then gave his age as 18 and enlisted as a drummer boy, becoming the first from his hometown of Everton, IN. He was given a Bible, which he had until his death in 1939.

Veatch was given the honorary title of "Colonel" because of his 30 years of service in Oroville¹s Wm. T. Sherman GAR Post 96. He also was affectionately dubbed Gridley¹s ³Grand Old Man" and both the Gridley Museum building and a street in Oroville bear his name.

Participants laid wreaths at Veatch's grave, and an

honor guard fired a salute before Taps was played.

FLORIDA

Gen. Wm. S. Harney Camp 8 honored the Civil War soldiers buried in Orange City's Hollywood and Lincoln Cemeteries on November 13th in a Rededication Ceremony. PCC Msgr. William R. Cavins credits incoming CC David Hoover with the work of reidentifying these graves from WPA files compiled in the 1940s.





One of those identified was 2Lt. Hadley P. Burrill who was the postmaster in Chelsea, MA before being elected 2Lt. in the 4th MA Inf. Militia (90 days). He moved his family to Orange City by 1880 and worked as an agriculturalist farmer. The ceremony was held at his grave.

On October 9th, Junior William Zoughaib was one of two members of St. James Camp 326, who participated in the annual Spirit Reunion at St. Genevieve's Memorial Cemetery.

Br. Zoughaib portrayed 15-year old Civil War soldier Jacob Zimmer, a musician in Co. I, 30th MO Inf., who died in December 1862 while in a hospital at St. Genevieve. This was one of 20 spirits represented and viewed by nearly 150 visitors.

On November 28th, as part of the 146th Anniversary Battle of Franklin Memorial Assembly, members of Fort Donelson Camp 62 and the 10th Reg., TN US Vol. Inf, SVR, marched from Fort Granger to the Carter House, the epicenter of intense fighting during the battle. The 10th TN U.S. Inf. SVR color guard, commanded by 1Sgt. David DuBrucq, led the Camp 62 and relatives on the 1.1 mile march through the streets of Franklin, TN. 


WELCOME NEW CAMPS!






