



A GRAND ARMY MEMORIAL THAT WILL LIVE ON THROUGH THE AGES



This Historical Banner consists of silk ribbon delegate badges of G. A. R., Women's Relief Corps, Ladies of G. A. R., Daughters of Union Veterans, Sons of Union Veterans and Auxiliary. It measures 45 x 55 feet.

It was designed and created by Mrs. Marian O. Kornbleet, Acting Sec'y, to the G. A. R., Dept. of Mo. and financed by John Hollingsworth, Senior Vice-Commander, Dept. of Mo. Presented to the Department and National G. A. R. in 1936,

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A beautiful banner was made of Veterans badges from all over the United States. The idea was conceived by Comrade Hollingsworth and carried out by Marrion Kornbleet, Past President of Lincoln Circle No. 19.

It was presented to the Department of Missouri by Comrade Hollingsworth through Jessie Bates, Department President of the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, to Comrade Barnes, who in turn appointed Jeanette Dunford, Past Department President to have charge of it until such time as it could be presented from the Missouri Department to the National Body.

Commander Hollingsworth, assisted by Jeanette Dunford, Jessie Bates and Marrion Kornbleet presented the banner to the National Body at the National Convention in Washington, D. C.

The banner was accepted and returned to the committee, and will rest in the State Capitol Building in Jefferson City until the National Memorial Shrine Building is completed.

Sister LoRena Fleming Past Department President gave a tribute to Past Department President, Sister Amy Clark, a carnation was placed for her, and Sister Emma Hyatt, Past Department President paid tribute to Past Department President Sister Kate Stancliffe.

Comrade Best of Kansas City paid tribute to our deceased Comrades and at the close few eyes were dry.

The Chaplain then asked for a moment of silent prayer and as Sisters Wright. Wildhagen and James sang, "The Old Rugged Cross" the Circle Chaplains filed slowly to the back of the room.

We were dismissed with a prayer.



REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT

Having been elected first delegate to the National Convention, The responsibility of the duties of delegate-at-large, was mine to assume, when the serious illness of the son of your elected delegate-at-large prevented her attending the National Convention. I realized the responsibility of bringing to this Convention, the report of the National Convention and put forth the best in me to that end. I was in my place when every session convened and stayed until adjournment, until Thursday, 4 p. m. when Sister Margaret Stone assumed my duties.

I arrived in Grand Rapids at 9:30 p. m. Saturday. September 7, 1935. Sunday morning I had the pleasure of greeting friends, members of the patriotic organizations. Sunday p. m. I was taken to the Michigan Soldier's Home The weather was threatening and the presentation of a Memorial Bench for the lawn was hastened and I arrived just at the close of the exercises. I met Col. James R. Davis, Commandant of the Home who escorted Sister Dill and me through the buildings aand grounds. Volumes could be written regarding the grandeur, sanitary conditions and modern equipment of this Home. As we went to the auditorium, Col. Davis called our attention to the group of Ladies

assembled for entertainment. I was introduced to the ladies and made about a five minute talk, I spoke to them of our official publication "The Bugle Call, five minute taik. I spoke to them of our official publication. The Bugle Call, They had not heard of the paper. I subscribed to the Bugle Call for the Michigan Soldiers' Home and Col. Davis assured me he would request careful handling in reading it and would make it go through the Home. I hope this will create an interest and be the means of subscriptions from Michigan.

Sunday evening I attended Memorial Exercises at the Civic Auditorium.

Col. John G. Emery, General Chairman of arrangements presided. A profusion of potted plants and flowers greeted the eye as one entered. The National heads of Patriotic Organizations were seated on the rostrum. A mound of green represented a grave on the left—as their names were called each officer crossed the rostrum and hung a wreath on the side of the grave, each wreath overlapping the other giving the appearance of a chain. Flashlight pictures were taken as each wreath was placed. Flood lights were thrown on the rostrum and the strains of Rock of Ages, rendered by the orchestra, made the occasion sacredly beautiful. Col. Emery said, "May this chain. thus welded, ever keep us true to Liberty, Justice and Democracy,

The memorial address by Chief Justice of Michigan Supreme Court was a masterpiece of eloquence. He quoted Franklin when he said, "We must hang together or we hang separately." He spoke of activities in our capital city, referred to the attempt to over-throw our Constitution and said "Some of our Congressmen seem to have a vacuum where their brains should be." In a brief talk by the Chaplain-in-Chief of the G. A. R. he said Post No. 1 of the G. A. R. was organized at Decatur, Ill., Iuly 6, 1866, In 1870 a member's badge was made and approved by the United States Senate.

On Monday morning, I attended the breakfast given by Betsy Ross Club. This was a very enjoyable affair. Our Department President was the guest

of the retiring President, Marguerite Rigos, who introduced her.

After breakfast I visited the G. A. R. headquarters and registered. Also visited headquarters of D. U. V. Then registered in our own headquarters.

Motion and second to eliminate reading of National President's report in as much as printed report, in book form, is in hands of every delegate.

Motion carried. Motion made and seconded to place each report in hands of committees on officers report, Carried. National Secretary report read and placed in hands of committee. National President recommends each Department President forward to National, names on charter of Department. Up to date there are 31 Departments, 729 Circles, Only 257 Circles sent reports, Total membership is 28,873. Department of Missouri per capita tax is \$206.32.

National Council of Administration is introduced. Reports of National Officers read and placed in hands of Committee-on-Officers Reports. At 11:45 Comrade Mason of Maine and Comrade Wildman of Conn. were escorted in. Both spoke flatteringly of our work and women's advancement and interest in the affairs of this nation. The National Soloist sang. We'd Climb the Highest Mountain if we thought that when we climbed that Mountain we'd find you. Comrade Wildman informs us Conn. alone does not hold their encampment with other Patriotic Orders.

Response to these G. A. R. men was made by Sister Sawyer, formerly of Maine but now of California. Motion to adjourn and reconvene at 1:30

p. m. They Convened at 2 p. m. Tuesday.

The Past President of Michigan Federation of Women's Club was next to bring greetings and presented our National President with a basket of flowers. Senior Vice-Commander Harding Merrill of Wichita, Kansas, and National Commander-in-Chief, Alfred E. Stacey were welcomed at this time. The delegation from the Department of Kansas went to the National President's station to greet Comrade Merrill. The response to greetings from these veterans was made by National Musician. Margaret Grandle of Kansas. Then followed many greeting committees, each bringing a gift to National President Cooke. Now another visit from G. A. R. veterans who report that out of 660 Posts of G. A. R. only 122 Posts remain. They urge publicity of our activities to build up our membership. Of 812 addresses lost all but 11 were found, by aid of member. Sisters Mollie Neubauer, Marquerite Riggs and Hattie Moore, all of St. Louis, were thanked for their part in locating the lost addresses.

Adjourned to meet at 8:30 Wednesday.

At 7:30 a. m. Wednesday, Missouri delegation and friends gave a breakfast in honor of our Department President, Jessie Bates. The rap of the National President's gavel found us in our places. The pass word was taken at the door as we entered by the conductors. Before we resumed business, tickets for the Courtesy Luncheon, given National Delegates at the Park Congregational Church and tickets for the grandstand to view the parade were also given. Motion carried to place the report of the National Senior Vice-President in journal without reading. Then followed reports of National officers. A balance of \$2,043.35 reported in Memorial Shrine Fund. Report of Legislative body received.

Adjourned till 1:30 p. m. to view the parade. The weather was ideal. the skies clear and our Flag never looked more beautiful, nor meant more than in this parade. We were proud of our Department Commander, Perry Martin, as he walked with so much pep. Though a beautiful sight the parade always causes a shudder and many a tear as we are reminded of the vast number of Boys in Blue who have "crossed the great Divide" since our last parade, and when we realize "Their service, our heritage, their love, our benediction" what a forceful reminder of our duty to our organization.

After the parade a splendid courtesy dinner was served to all delegates and Comrades by the Grand Rapids Ladies of the G. A. R. The souvenirs were solid wood chairs, reminding us Grand Rapids has splendid furniture factories. The cheer songs of different states, were much appreciated but if I were judge, I would award the "blue ribbon" to the colored ladies Circle when they sang "My Old Kentucky Home." The pianist, one of their own

members, did justice to the dear old song.

Adjourned for luncheon.

At this time flags for most Patriotic work done was presented by Nat-

ional Patriotic Instructor, Frances Rohrback.

Sister Gregory inquired time of election of officers, saying some are going

home at midnight.

Revision Committee worked untill 3 a. m. Motion made and carried to permit revisions as submitted and place same in hands of National Treasurer. Work of revision committee accepted and that the committee be permanent.

Report of Advisory Council read and accepted. Photographers came in and took pictures of National President and her

Staff and Past National officers.

National Proceedings on hand to sell for 25 cents. Cost 50 cents. Sister Josephine Mahar presents a basket of flowers from National Span-

ish War Veterans to our National President.

Michigan Past Department Commander of Spanish War Veterans was announced. The basket of flowers was returned and presented by the Post Department Commander of Spanish War Veterans. Greetings by President of Michigan Home Board. Shea.

Recommendatons No. 2: Shall the flag be placed on the altar. Voted, yes. Motion carried to incorporate nationally for prominence and protection.

Rules of Order not satisfactory.

Sister Edwina Trigg is retained as Chairman of Memorial Shrine by vote of body. More G. A. R. comreades came to greet us. They report 672 G. A. R. men at Convention.
