

#### Phelps Camp #66 - Springfield, Missouri

#### "1863" LECTURE SERIES THIS SUMMER

Members of Phelps Camp have agreed to sponsor one of the speakers at the upcoming summer Civil War lecture series at the Springfield-Greene County Public Library. In return, Phelps Camp will be allowed to have a recruiting table at the talk and briefly address the audience on the mission of the SUVCW. Topics for the July series will include Honey Springs, Baxter Springs, U.S. Grant, Vicksburg, Guerrilla Warfare, George Meade, and many others. The final schedule is all but "set in stone," with many great programs scheduled at the Springfield Library Center from July 10-20. Phelps Camp will be sponsoring our own Michael Price's presentation on Friday, July 19 at 6:30 p.m. Michael's program, "Victor of Gettysburg: George Meade and Civil War History" promises to be both enlightening and entertaining.

Saturday, May 18, 11 a.m.—Dedication of the new Jasper County park commemorating the 1863 massacre of Union African-American soldiers at Sherwood. Phelps Camp members were urged to attend wearing membership medals (no living history clothing required). Here's more on the event from Kip Lindberg:

On 18 May, 1863, a Federal foraging party from Baxter Springs was at the farm of a Confederate soldier named Rader, in the community of Sherwood, which was the fourth largest community in Jasper County.

While removing forage from the Rader Hone, the Federals were set upon by Confederate guerillas under Thomas Livingston. Fifteen men of the 1st Kansas Colored Infantry, and three men of the 2nd Kansas Battery, were either killed or murdered after capture. Some mounted members of the 2nd Kansas Battery escaped back to Baxter Springs, and by the time a reinforced expedition could return to Sherwood, the bodies of the dead had been stripped and mutilated. A local man, John Bishop, was found nearby, wearing bloody clothing, and thinking him one of the executioners, the Federals killed him. His body, with those of the 1st Kansas Colored, were thrown into the Rader home, and burned.

This event also commemorated several Civil War events in the area, and honored the Federal, Confederate, and civilian dead, as well as drum up support and awareness of the project to recreate the Rader Farm as a living history park, to commemorate the Civil War events of Jasper County. When rebuilt, the farm will offer a unique location for future living history events. The program started at 11A.M. The location for the Sherwood commemoration was just north of West Fountain Road and North Peace Church Road, which is about two miles west of Hwy 43, and about 3 miles south-west of the Joplin Regional Airport.

#### Sigel Camp #614 - Rolla, Missouri

#### Sigel Camp #614 Presents ROTC Award in Rolla and Waynesville

Sigel Camp #614, Missouri Department, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, recently presented the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War ROTC Award to a cadet from each of Missouri S&T's ROTC programs and one from Waynesville High School JROTC. The awards were presented to Cadet Hector Cruz of Army JROTC on April 25, Cadet Rex D. Stanton, Jr. of Army ROTC Stonehenge Battalion on May 7, and to Cadet Jacob Francka of Air Force ROTC Detachment 442 on May 11. The Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War ROTC Award is presented to a cadet who "shows a high degree of patriotism to his/her Nation and has demonstrated a high degree of academic performance and leadership." Randal A. Burd, Sr., ROTC Award Coordinator for Sigel Camp #614, presented the awards during each unit's respective awards ceremony.

The Civil War was a profound influence on the formation of ROTC programs. It was on July 2, 1862, in the midst of the second year of civil war, that President Abraham Lincoln signed the Morrill Art, which provided federal land to aid in the formation of colleges which emphasized education in agriculture, engineering, and military tactics. In the model of Captain Alden Partridge's "American System of Education," ROTC realized the vision of creating citizen-soldiers who would become leaders in industry, commerce, government, and agriculture in peacetime and skilled military leaders during war.<sub>1</sub>

The National Defense Act of 1916 established the United States Army Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (JROTC). High schools were authorized, under the provisions of the Act, the loan of federal military equipment and active duty military personnel received assignments as instructors. The Vitalization Act opened JROTC up to the other services in 1964, and retirees replaced most of the active duty instructors. According to Title 10 of the U.S. Code, "the purpose of Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps is to instill in students in United States secondary educational institutions the value of citizenship, service to the United States, personal responsibility, and a sense of accomplishment."<sup>2</sup>

The SUVCW is committed, by honoring deserving cadets such as Cadet Hector Cruz, Cadet Rex D. Stanton, and Cadet Jacob Francka, to recognizing those who have stepped forward to accept the challenge of leadership in defending our Nation's flag, principles, and freedoms. It will be these young people who will eventually serve in our Nation's military, under the flag our forefathers fought to preserve.

Sigel Camp #614, Department of Missouri, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, is excited to add the aforementioned three programs to those included in the Department of Missouri's ROTC recognition efforts.

#### Students learn about Civil War through mock battle

As the sun shone brightly overhead, a group of students in blue Union hats and blue shirts with gold buttons responded to a call of "forward, march" and moved to the beat of drums that rang out over the clinking sound of the supplies moving around in their knapsacks. Some of the students held flags with a circle of stars, and a few were dressed in full Union uniforms. Eventually, the kids marched from Midway Heights Elementary School to a nearby field where they met a group of their peers dressed in gray Confederate uniforms, and the two armies engaged in mock battle. The youngsters held up their wooden muskets and shouted, "Bang!" as soldiers in the opposing army fell to the ground, some more dramatically than others.

"The re-enactment was really fun. It's not really what it did feel like, but it kind of gives you an idea of what it did feel like," said Grant Elementary School fifth-grader Alex Ossana-Galen. Students from Grant and Two Mile Prairie elementary schools traveled to Midway yesterday for the annual Civil War Day, which culminated with a battle re-enactment. Midway has had a Civil War Day for about 15 years with Two Mile Prairie joining in on the events a few years later, followed by Grant about seven years ago. "I think it brings history to life. It shows this real perspective you can't get out of a book," said Janet Swope, who teaches fifth grade at Midway.

The students enthusiastically agreed that they prefer more hands-on activities to reading history books. "You actually get to do something physical and go outside," said Grant fifth-grader Silas Kluever. Silas also said he learned much throughout the day, such as what technology was like during the Civil War and how technology often evolves during war. Before the battle, several learning stations were set up around the school on topics including technology, camp life, music during the Civil War, a writing station and an artillery station that included some math lessons.

During the re-enactment, students could choose to be soldiers, nurses, surgeons, map makers, sketch artists or reporters. After the re-enactment, Larry Dietzel of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War talked about the seriousness of war. "This is not to glorify war," Grant teacher Matt Kuensting said. "We emphasize to students that if they were wounded, they wouldn't be back in class tomorrow. It's kind of sobering. It brings home the point that there were people that were not brought back home."

Dietzel also stressed to the kids the importance of knowing their country's history.

"I think seeing it gives them an idea of what the soldiers did daily ... and gets them to realize they were real people," he said.

Students also learn about the Civil War's impact in Missouri, such as the Battle of Centralia. In years past, students have even visited the battlefield.

"We want them to know history takes place all around them. It's right here," Two Mile teacher Rob Allen said.

Three elementary schools take part in re-enactment. Larry Dietzel, a Civil War reenactor with the Sons of Union Veterans Tiger Camp 432, instructs fifth grade students from Midway, Two Mile Prairie and Grant Elementary Schools how to fall in formation before a battle reenactment begins near Midway Elementary School. Charles Cunningham, a member of the Missouri Brigade Medical Services, hands out muskets to the


