We are expecting to receive in the middle of April the grave marker furnished by the Veterans Administration for Private James Bryce Young. He served in Company C, 47th Missouri Infantry Regiment during the Civil War. He is buried in the Saint John the Evangelist Catholic Church Cemetery in Lithium, Perry County, Missouri.

He died on 15 November 1911 and lay in a grave that was only marked by a cross.

Once we have placed the grave marker at his grave we will then schedule a date in order to have a ceremony. Please make time to help us honor him.

PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTOR TRIVIA

Army Flag

Did you know that during the Civil War there was standard size for a Garrison Flag? Garrison flags are the flags that fly over military installations.

Present day Garrison Flags are 20 feet by 38 feet displayed for Holidays and special occasions if it has a tall enough flag pole. Post Flags are 8 feet 11 3/8 inches by 17 feet. The Post flag is flown for everyday display over military installations.

Old Glory or the Flag on display at the Smithsonian Institute Museum that flew over Fort McHenry originally measured 30 feet by 42 feet and weighed 50 pounds. It now measures 30 feet by 34 feet with most of the missing part being cut off as souvenirs.

HONOR GUARD POST AT LT. COLONEL J. FELIX ST. JAMES GRAVE



April 8th five members of the Lt. Col. J. Felix St. James Camp #326 posted a guard at the grave site of our Camp names sake. We posted the guard on the day that he died from his wounds received at the Battle of Shiloh/Pittsburg Landing, Tennessee. This is an annual event where a guard is posted at his grave. The day varies. Some years we do it on the day he was mortally wounded (April 6, 1862), the day he died of his wounds (April 8, 1862) or the day he was buried in Memorial Cemetery in Ste. Genevieve (April 15, 1862). It was a cool and extremely windy day with wind gusts getting close to forty miles an hour. We met at the Court House Square and at 10:45am we marched to Memorial Cemetery arriving there at 11 a.m. We post a rotating guard with each member guarding his grave for approximately fifteen minutes. ←L-R: Marty Aubuchon, Paul Kist, Ed Millinger, Camp

We know where Lt. Col. St. James is buried but his grave marker has been gone for a long time. The marker that you see to the left of Bob Mueller is the grave marker for his Father and Mother, Augustus and Desilee St. Gem.

His father died on March 23, 1862 just two weeks before Lt. Col. St.James was mortally wounded.

We know that he had a grave marker because his brother, Gustavus St. Gem, who was a member of the J. Felix St. James, Grand Army of Republic Post #326 in Ste. Genevieve, stated that on Decoration Day the GAR Post would march to his brother's grave site and lay flowers at his marker. He also stated that Lt. Col. St. James was buried next to his parents.

His grave remains unmarked due to the regulations of the organization in town that is responsible for maintaining the history of Memorial Cemetery.

We have asked permission at different times to place a VA marker but so far it has not happened.



DID YOU KNOW

Lt. Colonel J. Felix St. James was second in command of the 13th Missouri Infantry Regiment? Shortly after the Battle of Shiloh the 13th Missouri Infantry Regiment became the 22nd Ohio Infantry Regiment. The flags of the 13th Missouri Infantry Regiment are still in possession of the State of Ohio. In a cemetery if you see a grave marker with 22nd Ohio Infantry under the name, don't wonder why and Ohio veteran moved to Missouri. He was a Missouri Man.

SETTING THE GRAVE MARKER FOR PRIVATE JAMES BRYCE YOUNG

April 18th the grave marker for Private James Bryce Young, Company C, 47th Missouri Infantry Regiment, was set at his grave site. His site had been marked with a wooden cross that simply said Mr. Young on it.

He is buried in John the Evangelist Roman Catholic Church Cemetery in Lithium, Perry County, Missouri.

He was born in 1827 and died on November 15, 1912.

Service Record

On 20 August 1864, Private Young enlisted into Company C, at the age of thirty-five. He was born in Perry County, Missouri and was a farmer by occupation. He had blue eyes, brown hair and a fair complexion. He was five feet and nine inches tall.

Company C was mustered into Federal Service on 29 August 1864 at Pilot Knob, Missouri.

On the Company Roll for November and December 1864 he was listed as "absent sick in Perry County, Missouri from 12 December 1864." He was mustered out on 29 March 1865 with the Regiment.

CEREMONY AT PRIVATE JAMES BRYCE YOUNG GRAVE SITE

On June 4th, a dedication ceremony was conducted at the grave site of Private James Bryce Young. Private Young is buried in John the Evangelist Roman Catholic Church Cemetery in Lithium, Perry County, Missouri.

Four members of our camp, in April set the grave marker (see article on page 3).

Camp Commander Mike Schaaf was the master of ceremonies and handed out the programs for the ceremony.

Earlier this year he discovered Private Young did not have a grave marker so he contacted the Och family, a father and son team who maintain the cemetery and church, the church is no longer active. He spent several months trying to contact a direct descendent but could not find anyone. He also used facebook pages of Perry County Genealogy and Historical groups to advertise the ceremony in hopes that people would be interested in attending

The day was a warm day but there was plenty of shade for everyone to stand in during the ceremony.

 \leftarrow At our camp meeting on June 13th, we learned the meaning of each fold of the 13 Step folding procedure for folding a flag used during a ceremony. When the flag is folded thirteen times it ends in a perfect triangle with no red showing on the flag and is supposed to represent a cocked hat of General George Washington's Army during the Revolutionary War. The thirteen folds represent the original thirteen colonies.

It is unsure when the thirteen folds and the meaning of each fold were originated. Some people credit an Air Force Chaplain at the Air Force Academy and others believe it originated with the Gold Star Mothers of America.


We also voted at our last meeting to approve handing out some flag certificates to businesses or organizations that display the flag. The places voted on were,


who came through to hear the story of those who are buried in the cemetery. There were 148 adult visitors and several had their children with them who came by to hear the story of those who are buried in the cemetery.

It is the end of another year. Christmas is one of my favorite times of year. Think back to the time when you were a kid and Christmas was a time for family.

The celebration of Christmas began with a family.

In a way the SUVCW is a family. We get together once a month and have fellowship and eat and have a meeting where we plan family activities.

If you haven't joined us lately we meet every month on the second Tuesday in Ste. Genevieve at Sirros Restaurant.

We meet before 5 pm to eat and then our meeting begins at 6 pm and is usually over between 6:30 and 6:45.

December 25th, 1776 the Continental Army crossed the Delaware River in boats and on December 26th attacked the British army in a surprise attack upon the Hessian forces stationed in Trenton, New Jersey. A major victory for General George Washington and his army.

December 24th – 27th, 1864 the First Battle of Fort Fisher was a failed attempt by the Union Army to capture this fort on the coast line of North Carolina. The Union troops were under the command of Major-General Benjamin Butler. They were soundly defeated. He was relieved of command on January 8th, 1865 and replaced by Major General Alfred H. Terry who captured Fort Fischer on January 19, 1865.

December $18^{th} - 29^{th}$, 1972, Operation Linebacker II in North Vietnam. President Richard Nixon ordered eleven successive days of raids by B-52 Stratofortress Bombers flown from Andersen Air Force Base in Guam. The troops were given a 36 hour break to celebrate Christmas. In eleven days 15,000 tons of bombs were dropped on North Vietnam. 15 U.S. B-52s were destroyed, 35 men were killed and nearly Americans became prisoners of war.

December 25th, 1896 the song "Stars and Stripes Forever" was born. This song became the official National march for America in 1897.

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




The Lt. Col. J. Felix St. James Camp #326 has a Camp Guard. We elected Brother Martin Aubuchon, Captain of our Camp Guard.


