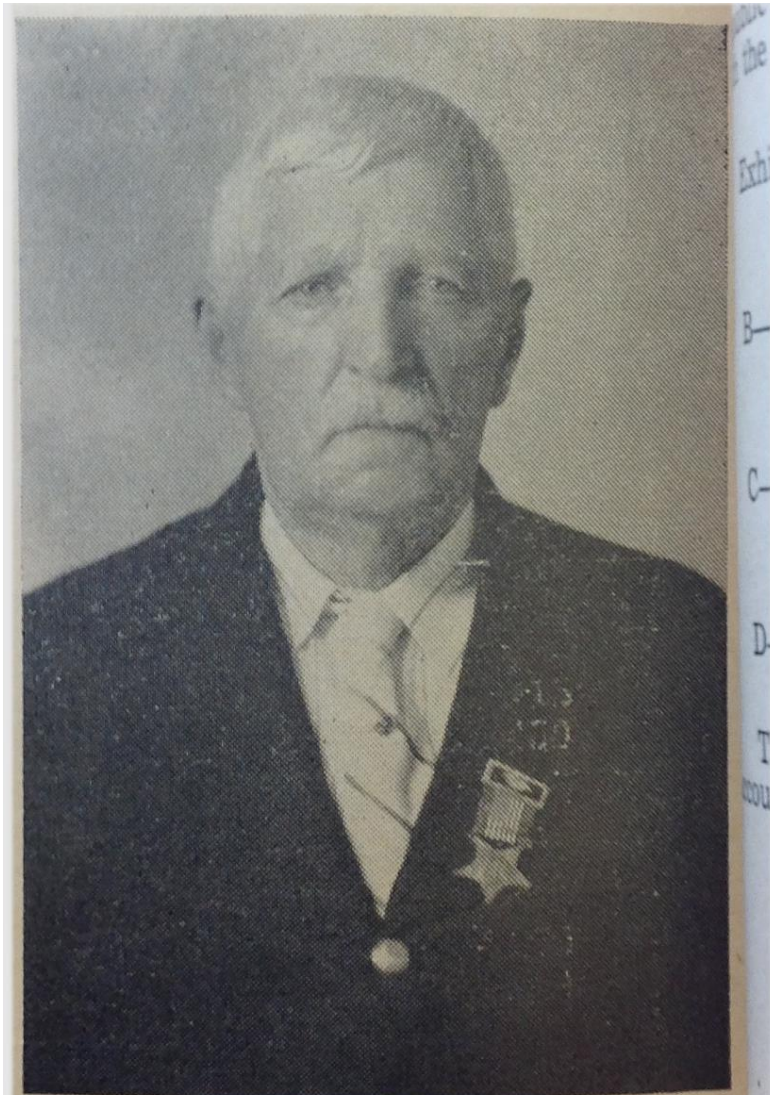

August Moreau served under the name August Francis during February 11, 1863 – February 10, 1864 aboard Gunboat No. 12 USS *Curlew*, which vessel did almost constant convoy duty with the Mississippi River Squadron. Moreau, upon enlistment at age sixteen, was a citizen of Texas. As a native of Paris, France, he is notable for being among the last nine foreign-born Civil War survivors. Seaman “Francis” re-enlisted on August 26m 1864, and served on *Grampus*, *Neosho*, and *Great Western* until his final discharge August 20, 1865. Strangely, Moreau, as an ancient mariner, enjoyed a wide reputation (perhaps he encouraged it) as the last survivor of the USS *Monitor* – a myth, for he never served on the East Coast. A G.A.R. sagamore, he was a Memorial Day diehard in St. Louis parades for over fifty years, missing his first one only in 1944.

Parshall, Zachary Taylor (25 Apr 1847 - 25 Mar 1941) Buried at Jefferson Barracks.

Unidentified Unit, probably same person as Taylor Parshall (since he was born in Michigan) who was in the Co H 1st & Co K 6th Michigan Cav. Lived 2117 67th St Normandy, MO

Patterson, James (3 May 1844 - 6 Mar 1941) Buried at Memorial Park Cem. Lived 6429 Leschen, Wellston, MO. Unidentified Unit.
