WREATHS ACROSS AMERICA NEEDS RECRUITS/DONATIONS

Rachel Donelson Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution is sponsoring Maple Park Cemetery for Wreaths Across America.

On December 19 at 11:00 am, Rachel Donelson Chapter DAR will be helping Maple Park Cemetery to remember and honor our veterans by laying remembrance wreaths on the graves of our country's fallen heroes.

Please help us honor and remember as many fallen heroes as possible by sponsoring remembrance wreaths, volunteering on Wreaths Day, or inviting your family and friends to attend with you.

Information is below on how to sponsor a wreath. The deadline to order wreaths is November 30.

There are 240 veterans buried at Maple Park Cemetery in Springfield, MO. Eight wars and five military branches are represented, including the Civil War.

Wreaths are \$15 each, with **\$5 given back to the DAR**. If you have a veteran family member or friend buried at Maple Park, you may request that your wreath be laid on a specific veteran's grave.

Marker Dedication

John & Roxanna Ray **Historical Headstone**

Sunday, August 9, 2020 2:00 p.m.

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630 South Lynn Republic, Greene Co., Missouri

John and Roxanna Ray Marker/Headstone

(Located in Lindsey Cemetery, S. Lynn Ave., Republic, MO)



John A. Ray born TN, Oct. 16, 1816, died June 22, 1875 Roxanna Ray born GA, Dec. 1, 1819, died Mar. 30, 1876

John Ray married widow Roxanna Steele about 1849, both residents of Wison Greek, Mo. They built their home along the Old Wire Road where John, a Unionist, served as Postmaster for 10 years. They had a thriving 420-acre farm with crops, orchards, and livestock. On August 10, 1861, the Ray's cornfield became part of the Battle of Wison's Creek. While John watched from the porch, Roxanna, Rhoda (the Ray's slave), the children, and hired hand Julius Short took shelter in the cellar. When the battle ended, they emerged to find their home had been converted to a field hospital. While they assisted the wounded and dying, their crops and livestock were confiscated. Afterward, the Rays restored the farm, where they lived until their deaths.
