Battle of Montevallo

April 14, 1862

Vernon County sent more men to fight for the Confederacy (proportionate to its population) than any other county in Missouri. In the spring of 1862, Confederate Col. John Coffee made a speech at the Montevallo Academy which yielded about 70 new recruits. This Confederate activity caught the attention of federal authorities.

At 7:00 PM on Apr. 13, 1862, Lt. Col. Charles Moss, commanding 27 men of Co. K, 1st Iowa Cavalry, entered Old Montevallo (1 mile west of present location). The federal force camped at the Scobey Hotel.

At 4:30 AM, the federal soldiers were attacked by about 25 members of Capt. Henry Taylor's Confederate co. who had been hastily organized by Dr. John Dade, Wilson Maddox and Bob Bayles. The battle lasted until dawn, when the attackers retreated. Federal casualties totaled 2 dead, 4 wounded, and 2 captured (recovered later that day). Taylor's men suffered 7 casualties, three being mortal, including "Wild Irishman" Daniel Henly.

Before departing on Apr. 14th, Moss ordered all the buildings in town to be burned. After the war, Montevallo was rebuilt on its present site.

Battle of Horse Creek

Aug. 7, 1862

Thirteen Confederate recruits riding from Balltown to Col. John Coffee's camp on Horse Creek were intercepted 2 miles SE of old Montevallo by federal troopers belonging to 20-year-old Maj. Bacon Montgomery's battalion of the 6th MO Cavalry, in the lopsided skirmish which followed, 5 of the recruits were killed, 7 captured, and 1 escaped. The slain were buried in a single grave near where they fell. Friends later raised a vault over the burial spot with their names inscribed: A. Baker, John A. Camp, G.W. Champion, J.W. Crenshaw, Erasmus Tucker.

Battle Of Church In The Woods

Aug. 5, 1862

Col. William Barstow entered old Montevallo with 115 men of the 3rd Wisconsin Cavalry, intending to attack Confederate Col. John Coffee's camp on nearby Horse Creek. Upon learning of the federal force, Col. Coffee led his 300-400 men to Montevallo and chased the Wisconsin troops from the town. A running battle ensued, which passed by Dunnegan Grove Church and continued SW to Hog Eye in Barton County. Many routed federals were captured or forced to abandon their equipment. Nine unknown federal soldiers buried in Dunnegan Grove Cemetery are believed to have been slain in the fight.







Battle of Montevallo monument dedication slated for April 14

The dedication of a monument memorializing the Battle of Montevallo is slated for 11 a.m., Saturday, April 14, the 150th anniversary of the event. Civil War re-enactors, bagpipe music and commemorative speeches are planned.

A free lunch of hotdogs and chips will be served after the ceremony, to be followed by a 2 p.m. open house of the remodeled Bushwhacker Museum in Nevada, where the costumed Carol Bohl of Harrisonville will portray Vernon County "Lady Bushwhacker" Rebecca Gabbert (1814-1894). All events are open to the public.

Museum Coordinator Will Tollerton said the three-by-four-foot granite marker has been cut and engraved by Brophy Monument of Nevada and Freeman Monument west of Harrisonville.

Specifically, the marker will tell of three local historic eventss, the Battles of Montevallo, Church in the Woods and Horse Creek.

The effort was spearheaded by longtime Vernon County Historical Society board member Eldon Steward of El Dorado Springs.

Battle of Montevallo Dedication

SUVCW Phelps Camp #66 and Westport Camp #64 participated in the Battle of Montevallo Monument Dedication on April 14, 2012. This was a SUVCW Sesquicentennial Signature Event near Nevada, Missouri. An estimated 75 people attended the dedication in rural Missouri on the 150th anniversary of the Battle of Montevallo, which occurred April 13-14, 1862. The ceremony included an historical description of the two day battle by the Vernon County Historical Society; a personal story of the battle's impact on the Gabbert family by descendant and SUVCW member Robert Capps; and a reenactment of the skirmish by SUVCW members and Elliot's Scouts.

In 1962, Confederate forces were moving south through Missouri to re-organize while Union troops were positioning along the Missouri-Kansas boarder to stabilize and protect the civilian population. These statewide events collided in Montevallo, Missouri and many other Missouri towns. On April 13, 1862, 22 men from the 1st Iowa Cavalry arrived in Montevallo, Missouri and quartered themselves at the Scobey Hotel. That night, Confederates attacked the hotel with 25 men, resulting in two men killed on each side. The next morning, the 1st Iowa Cavalry declared Montevallo a Confederate bushwhacker hideout and proceeded to burn the town. Montevallo, Missouri was only four miles from Col. John Coffee's encampment of 250 Confederate troops. Fortunate for the 1st Iowa Cavalry men, Col. Coffee continued south instead of engaging the small Union garrison. The dedication ceremony was hosted by the Vernon County Historical Society with participation by the SUVCW Westport Camp, SUVCW Phelps Camp, SCV Coffee Camp, SCV Hughes Camp, and Elliot's Scouts.
